A vast field including soil erosion, erection of fences, biodiversity, rainfall and temperatures have to be monitored, grasses and tree sampling taken, exotic vegetation taken care of, fire hazards, water – dams, boreholes monitored, roads, game numbers and condition of animals checked. To name a few of the projects that need to be monitored and controlled on the game farm of some 5000 hectares. We now know where our Conservation fees go!

They have some 270 staff members and run an Academy with around 250 students who assist in the projects as well as studying for National and International certificates in the fields of hospitality, conservation, events or chef industry.

Some members of the group also paid a visit to the Wildlife and Rehabilitation Centre, which, by all accounts was extremely interesting. A variety of the animals were being taken care of having been injured on the road, brought in by local farmers, orphaned etc. Some will be released into the wild and others are being kept in the Centre.

Then we nearly had to spend an extra night as the residents of Hammanskraal were threatening to close both the R101 and N1 roads. However, on the morning of departure all was quiet and we could travel home safely.

A wonderful week was enjoined by all and will be placed on the list for a future visit.
